To illustrate what good care looks like, the group reflected on *pastor* being the Latin word for 'shepherd', a term deeply rooted in



Vicar's Viewpoint

As you read this, the soon-to-be General Election may well be somewhere towards the front of your mind. As I write, there has only been one televised debate so far which was its own peculiar spectacle, but by the time these words are before you, much more will certainly have been said.

This Newsletter will land on your mat at around the mid-point of the

year. The days will be largely at their longest, the weather (I pray) kind, and in church-terms, we are now in the second 'phase' of our thinking and worshipping lives. The time between Christmas and Easter is devoted to telling the story of the 'historical Jesus' – biblical accounts of the works and deeds of the man we Christians follow. Once we move away from Easter we are left with the injunction to learn from the teachings and examples of the man. First phase – narrative accounts; second phase – what those narrative accounts mean for us.

This leads me to wonder what Jesus would have done in the face of a British General Election. Certainly, he would have had a voice, a view. I think he would have publicly condemned the rise of semi-truths and semantic prestidigitation within the noise of rhetoric, but he would have listened intently all the same. He would have been attentive to all points of view, including those with which he profoundly disagreed. He would have voted – Jesus was a man of action. As to whom Jesus would have voted for, I will not speculate – but as a King himself, given in service to the least in this world of ours, I suspect that candidates exhibiting that same characteristic would be attractive as a proposition.

Of course, all of this is just vicary speculation, but I am sure of one thing – he would have prayed for those involved, for those who will take on the increasingly poisoned chalice of public office (as one who paid the highest price for those he came to serve). Doing nothing at all, remaining uninterested or uninformed wouldn't have featured in his Election preparations and I urge you along a similar path – if following in the example of Jesus is your thing. Cast an informed vote and be part of the difference you hope for. Best wishes

Teddington RNLI Lifeboats



As the RNLI celebrate 200 years of service this year, we asked Teddington RNLI Lifeboat Station for a potted history from their beginnings over 30 years ago, through to today.

The story started on 20 August 1989 when The Marchioness, a class 5 passenger vessel travelling along the River Thames, collided with the dredger *Bowbelle* and sank, resulting in the loss of 51 lives. The government of the day realised there was no meaningful emergency service on this highly populated, busy tidal water, and asked the RNLI to establish four lifeboat stations: Teddington, Chiswick, Tower Bridge and Gravesend. All opened on 2 January 2002 and today are the busiest in the country.

Teddington covers the stretch from Richmond Lock to Molesey Lock and responds to over 100 shouts a year on average. Thames RNLI lifeboats are the only ones in the RNLI fleet to have blue lights and sirens, as they operate on the narrow and busy Thames and need to be seen and heard. All shouts are carefully coordinated with the London Coastguard, but it is the Volunteer Launch Authorities at the station who decide whether or not to launch the lifeboats.

The Station currently has two D Class Inshore lifeboats, made by the RNLI with 50 bhp Mariner engines and a maximum speed of 25 knots per hour (30mph). They stop and turn in their own length, making them highly manoeuvrable for the difficult local conditions of locks, a weir, shallow and fast flowing water, and riverside beaches.

Teddington RNLI Lifeboat Station has thirty-plus fully trained volunteer shore and boat crew who live or work within three minutes travel time to the station and respond to a pager 24/7 365 days a year. At present, six of the crew are women, one of them a helm/captain. They are supported by around 25 land-based volunteers, including teams for education, fundraising and water safety.

This Lifeboat Station is very much a part of the local community, and last year attended nearly 50 local events where donations, as well as retail, directly and through legacies, raised over £34,000, helping keep Teddington RNLI afloat.

Matt Allchurch, Lifeboat Operations Manager said 'Teddington RNLI Lifeboat volunteer crew are active members of the local community and the support that this community gives us is vital. Over 500 local people came to meet us at our Open Day this year. We are proud to be part of such a vibrant town.'

Saint of the Month



Welcome to the vicar's new whimsy – Saint of the Month. The first such worthy is Saint Benedict (of Nursia, Abbot of Monte Casino, father of western Monasticism). Benedict was born near Rome in the early sixth century but didn't

much care for the hedonistic lifestyle of his friends, so he left them to it and lived as a hermit. The local clergy didn't much like Benedict because many of their flock joined him in his monastic lifestyle (about twelve communities-worth of followers), so he left Subiaco and moved to Monte Cassino where he founded his first monastery.

Sometime later, Benedict wrote his 'Rule' which is still used today by modern Benedictine monks and nuns. The Rule of Benedict was a manual describing how to live a monastic life, including behaviour and spirituality – with all actions called to be motivated by love. Benedict was a great believer in humility expressed before others, and he also believed that a person's spiritual life cannot be divorced from any other aspect of their life.

Benedict died, standing up, in around 550AD, and among his many patronages, is patron saint of schoolchildren and students, servants who broke their master's property, and cavers (as opposed to cavies, which are otherwise known as guinea pigs). *Father David*
