Vicar's Viewpoint

In the days to come I will preach on the subject of **compassion** which forms the core of some of the scriptural theming that our church will contemplate. You're a learned bunch, so you will know that our word 'compassion' is derived from a middle-English term used originally by churches to mean 'to suffer with...', and we all have a sense of its meaning to

us in our own lives.

Earlier this week we had our beloved crazy hound put to sleep – our ever-enthusiastic, oft grumpy, endlessly bossy dog that has been the bane of many a fellow dog-walker along the river path in the mornings. For those who have endured the unique agony of losing a pet, it is cursed by the transactional nature of the decision with the vet concerned and the lingering sense of 'Did I do the right thing?' shortly after "Sign here please, sir". Being in the room – being truly present convinced me that we made the right decision. We saw the suffering, we heard the whimpering and we did what we did out of compassion to her and in the context of a real connection.

It strikes me how disconnected we are from one another. Everything happens through a screen (computer or car) and I notice how compassion is dwindling and finger-pointing in increasing. How readily we can be angry about someone or something until we find ourselves sitting in the same room – when much of that anger dissipates in many cases.

Christianity is predicated upon human contact – not theological treatise. 'God is love' is practically outworked, not the subject of a neat essay. Christians who don't engage 'in person' with other humans cannot, I believe, be truly compassionate people. As summer comes, and we contemplate the harvest let us remember that the harvest of compassion is found most keenly in the faces of real people – not their glass bound simulacrum.

A Celebration of ALMA

I write this as I return from the annual ALMA Sunday celebration at St Paul's Cathedral. No, this isn't a celebration of all things 'Coronation Street', but rather an opportunity to celebrate our link, as a parish, with the parish of Pemba, Cabo Delgado in Mozambique with whom we are partnered through the Angola London Mozambique Association (ALMA). It was a service of celebration for a warm and reciprocal friendship with Fr. Bulaki and his people, and to pray for a region of Africa that is currently subject to unspeakable violence and the oppression of Christians. Recently, the school was destroyed by insurgents and the church robbed, with many of the residents fleeing into the bush to survive these incursions.

As we gathered in the pomp and circumstance of one of the finest cathedrals in Christendom, I wondered how far we were from the blood and dust of Pemba, where people worship in fear of their lives. Bishop Filomena from Angola preached a sermon on persistence in the quest for justice and I was reminded, in my clean robes and safe cathedral, sitting at the 'front' as an undeserved 'dignitary', that this fight and this persistence for justice can begin anywhere, even in London (and perhaps especially so).

It was a glorious service in both English and Portuguese (the language of Mozambique), and I come away reminded that the God of white marble tourist attractions is the same God in the desperate circumstances of lands I cannot begin to comprehend. I return home humbled because in relative terms, my faith is easy. For our friends in Pemba, theirs comes at a high price.

Saint of the Month

St Mary the Virgin

Madonna del Rosario (c 6th century icon) Love her or (inheriting traditional Protestant mistrust) hate her, the one thing you



can't do with Mary, our patronal saint, is ignore her. It was from her that our Saviour learnt his humanity.

There are few biblical references to Mary; in some, there are, echoes of passages Hebrew Scrip-

tures. They are worth looking up: The Annunciation, the Visitation and Magnificat (Luke 1); the birth of Jesus, his Presentation in the Temple, and Mary remonstrating with him in the Temple as he entered adulthood at 12. (all in Luke 2): Jesus shoehorned into the miracle at Cana by his mother (John 2); Mary trying (and failing) to have an audience with her son (Matthew 12: 46-50); Jesus' words from the cross (John 19:26-27); and Mary praying with the disciples in Jerusalem after the Ascension (Acts 1:14). The woman, clothed with the sun, with the moon under her feet in Rev 12:1, who appears in the East window of our church, has also been interpreted as a reference to Mary.

If you spend enough time sitting with Mary and praying with her, shutting your mind to all the hot air and prejudice, you will find that, like any good mother, her one purpose is to lead you into the presence of her Son.

The Reformation martyr Hugh Latimer preached as follows:

"as the saffron-bag that hath been full of saffron [...] doth ever after savour and smell of the sweet saffron that it contained; so our blessed lady, which conceived and bare Christ in her womb, did ever after resemble the manners and virtues of that precious babe that she bare".
