## Vicar's Viewpoint



First, I want simply to acknowledge the sun which is shining. Wonderful. There is a greater sense of hope in a world increasingly shrouded in darkness (or so it seems), and for that I give thanks always.

Hope for Christians is witnessed most clearly in the resurrection of Jesus Christ at Easter. As I write, I have just embarked upon Lent, have given up abstention, and will almost certainly

emerge bleary-eyed from my many Lenten labours like some post-snooze tortoise just in time to greet the risen Christ. Whatever Lent brings us, we need hope. In his short story (and the excellent film), 'The Shawshank Redemption,' Stephen King tells a story of prison existence for a group of lifers. Within the story, one of the main characters refers to hope as a 'pipe dream', something to drive a person mad - to be avoided at all costs. While there are times when we can all have some sympathy with that sentiment, what would life be without hope?

One of the enduring characteristics of the Christian story and the church family is that component of hope. It is written into our DNA, even when we squabble over building extensions or moved furniture, or when the vicar picks a hymn with some ropey old words – there is hope, (and not just that the vicar might get it right next time). We endure Good Friday each and every year, and whilst it is right not to simple scan past its tragedy, our DNA tells us then – and through most of the rest of our time - that hope never fades and that our God is somehow in control. It doesn't remove pain when it is felt, and it doesn't automatically stop it raining or the sun to emerge, but it is there and we have to do nothing to bring it into being. Like God, hope simply is.

Whilst Christians have been busy with Lent, we get even busier with Holy Week and Easter. If you are unsure where this well of hope erupts through the surface, come to one or more of the services. The story may stick to you and convince you, but failing that Athe welcome you will get at the door will assure you that hope is real. When the time comes – Happy Easter.

It is hard for us here to fully appreciate all the hardships they have to suffer. Firstly, they have to contend with appalling weather conditions and as I write they are battling with yet another cyclone. As a result, many of their buildings, homes and churches get destroyed because they cannot afford to build houses with good foundations. The crops they rely on all suffer. The cost of living has increased so that many are now going hungry. As a result of the poor conditions they now have cholera which seems particularly to affect people aged 20-35 years, the main working population.

Around 75% of women cannot read or
